Your Lourdes Sunday Liturgy at Home

28th Sunday in Ordinary Time October 11, 2020

Come Correct! "Put on Christ!"

Dorothy Day, who was completely given to God and to God's poor, once said, "Even the lowest, most depraved, we must see Christ in them and love them to folly. When we suffer from dirt, lack of privacy, heat and cold, coarse food, let us rejoice" (quoted by James Forest in *Love Is the Measure*, Paulist Press, New York: 1986). Day had learned, as Paul did (in our second reading), to make the best of every circumstance. Surely she could also say with Paul, "I can do all things in him who strengthens me" (Phil 4:13).

Dorothy Day died on Nov. 29, 1980. Day's funeral Mass was attended by priests and nuns, but also by bag ladies, addicts, beggars, the homeless and all those other poor ones in whom she saw the face of God. Anyone looking on at those gathered for the feast in today's Gospel, and on those who came together for Dorothy Day's funeral, might characterize these groups as a motley crew. And so they were; and so WE are – a community of diverse members called together by God and graced with the gifts and ability to care for one another.

When Isaiah gives us a picture of God's feast on the peak, he wants our mouths to water. Picture chocolate cake, lemon meringue pie, creamy pastries, fresh fish, roasted lamb and beef on the spit, berries and cherries, milk and honey. The wine selection is like no other — aged to perfection. God's great festival takes place on the mountaintop, Jerusalem. The whole world is invited to enjoy the best creation has to offer. God prepares this feast for people who have had little to rejoice or celebrate in the recent past.

This is God's surprise party for humanity, specially planned for people who have been trapped in chaos and tragedy. Natural disasters and war have left them devastated. They've also failed to live their own ideals. According to Isaiah, they arrive veiled in mourning garb. This party is the last thing they expect.

Then they encounter God. Whatever their conception of the Almighty, they hardly expected God to hurry out like a mother and wipe the tears from their faces. But that's what God did. They came, scarred from their battles, guilty of everything human beings could imagine, and God invited them in. When no penalty could compensate for their wrong, God made no reproach. The whole earth was coming under the judgment of love. Nothing less.

In today's Gospel, we hear the third parable Jesus tells during his last week on Earth, in which he bedazzles the crowd with this tale he invites them to imagine. A king throws a wedding feast and gets no RSVPs. He sends out emissaries to the VIPs and they decline to come, and some even abuse the emissaries. Then the king casts a dragnet to scoop up anybody.

Moral standing is hardly a qualification for entry into the banquet as Jesus made quite clear with the words, "bad and good alike." The only difference between the banqueters and those gnashing their teeth in the dark was the partygoers' whole-hearted acceptance of the invitation. In the process, he gives his verdict on the situation: "Those who were invited were not worthy to come."

Who are the chosen? They are the ones willing to receive God's surprising and free offers. Their religious role or social position means so little that the higher the rank, the less likely they are to be at the banquet. What makes someone worthy? The unworthy are the ones who refused the invitation. The worthy must, therefore, be the people who were happy to receive a free meal. All that mattered was that they showed up.

But there was one hold out. Somebody came in who didn't belong. A fellow crashed the party not wanting to be a guest, not wanting to put on his best. The intruder didn't wear a wedding garment. In other words, whatever he was doing there, he didn't come to celebrate with the king and his family. He attended the event, but he had nothing to do with its purpose. He couldn't be allowed to stay; his attitude was a contaminant. Being at this celebration was an all or nothing affair. Anyone who showed up but didn't want to take part, was like vinegar in a milkshake — he curdled the atmosphere. The

garment required by all is the willingness to embrace and live according to the Gospel. That's the ticket to the beatific banquet.

Gospel - Matthew 22:1-14

- ¹ Jesus again in reply spoke to the chief priests and elders of the people in parables, saying,
- ² "The kingdom of heaven may be likened to a king who gave a wedding feast for his son.
- ³ He dispatched his servants to summon the invited guests to the feast, but they refused to come.
- ⁴ A second time he sent other servants, saying, 'Tell those invited:
- "Behold, I have prepared my banquet, my calves and fattened cattle are killed, and everything is ready; come to the feast."
- ⁵ Some ignored the invitation and went away, one to his farm, another to his business.
- ⁶ The rest laid hold of his servants, mistreated them, and killed them.
- ⁷ The king was enraged and sent his troops, destroyed those murderers, and burned their city.
- ⁸ Then he said to his servants, 'The feast is ready, but those who were invited were not worthy to come.
- ⁹ Go out, therefore, into the main roads and invite to the feast whomever you find.'
- ¹⁰ The servants went out into the streets and gathered all they found, bad and good alike, and the hall was filled with guests.
