Beloved of the Lord,

Our Lord calls us to be unapologetically pro-life. From the Fifth Commandment where murder is prohibited to the summary of all of God's Law: Love God and love your neighbor. We are committed to the care of all humanity as created in God's image: children, mothers, fathers, families ... all are precious in God's sight and deserve our love and care, especially in times when they are faced with decisions of life and death or as they deal with past decisions. We care for them with grace and the message of God's love and forgiveness.

Because we care for women, children (those born and not yet born), men, and families, we are compelled to speak and act when their wellbeing is threatened by the ideologies of this culture of death in which we find ourselves living. Issue 1 here in Ohio is one such threat. If passed it would place Ohio among the most abortion-permissive states. What follows is a letter of Rev. Dr. Kevin Wilson, President of the LCMS Ohio District that outlines the troubling and dangerous implications of the amendment if passed.

Briefly, I'd like to comment on the five areas of "reproductive decisions" this amendment proports to protect:

1. Contraception

Only forms of contraception that act as abortion-causing drugs have ever been proposed for restriction. Abortifacient drugs prevent the implantation and ongoing growth of a child once conceived. This ends the life of a child who should be protected. No legislation restricting abortion would restrict access to methods that would prevent a woman from getting pregnant in the first place.

2. Fertility treatment

Fertility treatments which result in the deliberate destruction of conceived children (either before or after in utero implantation) end the life of a child who should be protected.

3. Continuing one's own pregnancy

This suggests that only the woman is involved in the pregnancy without regard for the life of the child who should be protected.

4. Miscarriage care

The medical care for a woman who has experienced a miscarriage, ectopic pregnancy, or other perilous complications apart from a regular pregnancy has never been restricted. These medical treatments cannot be equated with elective abortion. Though the current state of medicine may result in the death of the child, the treatments are not done for the purpose of killing the child. The death of the child is the tragic result of the complication of pregnancy and not at all the same as the willful destruction of a child who should be protected.

5. Abortion

Abortion is the willful and deliberate killing of a child who should be protected. No one has the right to end the innocent life of another.

I understand that some may be convinced of nuanced ideological or political positions on these issues and may ultimately disagree. As Christians we must love our neighbor enough to set aside our political loyalties and examine issues based on our faith-informed conscience and ultimately act in Christ-like love for the defense of the defenseless. As we care for women and children–especially in heart-wrenching situations—we must seek solutions for them that do not increase their pain and trauma but rather see them through the loving eyes of Christ and support them in the preservation of life which will ultimately leave them without regret.

I urge you to vote against Issue 1 in order to protect women and children and ensure that parents remain at the center of their children's care.

Amendment with Highlighted Terms

Be it Resolved by the People of the State of Ohio that Article I of the Ohio Constitution is amended to add the following Section:

Article I, Section 22. The Right to Reproductive Freedom with Protections for Health and Safety

A. Every *individual* has a right to make and carry out one's own reproductive decisions, including but not limited to decisions on:

- 1. contraception;
- 2. fertility treatment;
- 3. continuing one's own pregnancy;
- 4. miscarriage care;
- 5. and abortion.

B. The State shall not, directly or indirectly, burden, penalize, prohibit, interfere with, or discriminate against either:

- 1. An individual's voluntary exercise of this right or
- 2. A person or entity that assists an individual exercising this right, unless the State demonstrates that it is using the least restrictive means to advance the individual's health in accordance with widely accepted and evidence-based standards of care.
- 3. However, abortion may be prohibited after fetal viability. But in no case may such an abortion be prohibited if in the professional judgment of the pregnant patient's *treating physician* it is necessary to protect the pregnant patient's life or *health*.

C. As used in this Section:

- 1. "Fetal viability" means "the point in a pregnancy when, in the professional judgment of the pregnant patient's treating physician, the fetus has a significant likelihood of survival outside the uterus with reasonable measures. This is determined on a case-by-case basis."
- 2. "State" includes any governmental entity and any political subdivision.
- D. This Section is self-executing.

A pastoral letter to the congregations and church workers of the Ohio District,

Greetings in the name of our Jesus, who has delivered us from death by his resurrection from the dead.

Ohio District church members in Ohio have an opportunity to demonstrate God's love for the least of our society in the statewide election on November 7, 2023. The opportunity is to vote against the proposed constitutional amendment, "The Right to Reproduction Freedom with Protections for Health and Safety."

This is a rare instance of my addressing with you both a political and a theological issue facing our church and our society. The sanctity of human life is a foundational biblical belief. God is the creator of the heavens and the earth, including our creator as human beings. (Genesis chapter 1). Our existence begins at conception, as we are told in Psalm 139:13, "For you formed my inward parts; you knitted me together in my mother's womb."

For this reason, abortion is contrary to God's will, including violating the 5th Commandment. The Lutheran Church – Missouri Synod maintains that abortion "is not a moral option, except as a tragically unavoidable byproduct of medical procedures necessary to prevent the death of another human being, viz., the mother". (1979 Res. 3-02A)

As Christians we are called to love our neighbor (Matthew 22:37-39, James 2:8). This love extends to defending those who cannot defend themselves. (Proverbs 31:9, Psalm 82:3). I think those at greatest risks in our society are unborn children.

For these reasons, this amendment is cause for grave concern. The amendment in its entirety can be found on the back side of this document. Here are my three deepest concerns.

Article 1, Section 22, A, states, "Every *individual* has a right to make and carry out one's own reproductive decisions, including but not limited to decisions on..." (boldface italics added by author)

The term "individual" is not qualified. This means that minors could make decisions about contraception, fertility treatments, or abortion, without parental knowledge or consent. Sex change surgeries for minors also could fall under the umbrella of "reproductive freedom."

Article 1, Section 22, B, 2., states: "However, abortion may be prohibited after fetal viability. But in no case may such an abortion be prohibited if in the professional judgment of the pregnant patient's *treating physician* it is necessary to protect the pregnant patient's life or *health.*" (boldface italics added by author)

The "treating physician" could be an abortionist. This amendment would allow abortionists to recommend and perform abortions at any time in the nine months of pregnancy.

It should also be noted that the term "health" has a broad legal definition. "Health" includes such aspects of life as physical, emotional, or financial wellness. This provides considerable width and breadth of the legal justifications of abortions that could be recommended and performed at any time during the pregnancy.

I encourage congregational members and church workers from all of our congregations to vote against this amendment. In addition to those who can vote in Ohio, I urge our brothers and sisters in West Virginia and Kentucky to pray for the protection of unborn children in Ohio in this election.
