2023 LCMS NATIONAL CONVENTION REPORT

From July 29 – August 3, delegates from across the Synod met in Milwaukee for the triennial national convention of the LCMS. More than one thousand delegates, elected from the Circuits of the Synod, including one pastoral and one lay delegate, met in worship and study, and to receive reports, conduct elections, and consider resolutions. It was a busy and productive week and we can give thanks to God for the work of the delegates and leadership of our Synod.

Elections

The Rev. Dr. Matthew C. Harrison, having received 52.32% of the votes cast, was reelected as president of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod (LCMS) for a fifth term of office, which runs from 2023 to 2026. The incumbent vice-presidents were all reelected including first vice-president, Rev. Peter Lange and the regional vice presidents.

Over the week the convention held elections for dozens of positions throughout the synod including the boards of regents for the universities and seminaries, boards of directors for the Synod and other Synod entities such as CPH and LCEF, and various commissions such as the Commission on Theology and Church Relations (CTCR).

Church Fellowship

We rejoiced to recognize full church fellowship with five new international church bodies: Evangelical Lutheran Church of South Sudan/Sudan (ELCSS/S) and the Evangelical Lutheran Mission Diocese of Finland (ELMDF), the Lutheran Church of Uganda (LCU) and the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Ukraine (ELCU). The convention also recognized the Ceylon Evangelical Lutheran Church (CELC) in Sri Lanka as a self-governing, full partner church of the LCMS. Unfortunately, we also had to recognize the broken fellowship with the Japan Lutheran Church (JLC) after years of talks and their continued acceptance of the ordination of women as pastors and open communion. After voting to recognize the broken fellowship, we were led in prayer not only for the return of the JLC to biblical doctrine and practice, but also that the LCMS be ready gratefully and joyously to reestablish fellowship with the JLC should they so return.

Communion and Worship Practices

The Synod voted to re-affirm the LCMS' historic position regarding close(d) Communion. President Harrison offered a brief explanation for the practice of closed Communion.

"First ... we really are concerned that people who receive the Sacrament are Christians. None of us wants to, as Paul says, give the Sacrament to somebody for their detriment," he said, referencing St. Paul's teaching in 1 Corinthians 11.

Second, Harrison also mentioned the repeated injunction of Scripture for complete unity in doctrine and teaching. Finally, he explained pastoral discretion. The LCMS has always acknowledged that pastors have discretion to make certain allowances based on circumstances. But Harrison also warned against the abuse of such practice: "Printing in your bulletin 'If you believe in the real presence, y'all come' is not pastoral discretion."

The Council of Presidents (or "COP", made up of all the district presidents), the Office of the President, and the CTCR will also be developing a process to discuss and evaluate the use of technology in the church, in particular such things as "virtual" worship, online Bible studies, online membership, and the like.

Human Sexuality

Resolution 5-11 reaffirmed the Synod's position on marriage and human sexuality, particularly that God created mankind as male and female, He instituted marriage to be an indissoluble union between man and woman, that Scripture reserves all sexual activity for the martial union between man and woman and prohibits all sexual activity between persons of the same sex. The resolution urges all "pastors to preach and teach God's counsel regarding the biblical design for marriage and sexuality with courage, as well as to exercise compassionate pastoral care to those struggling with sexual sin and misunderstanding."

Structure and Administration

I had the privilege of working on Floor Committee 9, Structure and Administration. Our resolutions dealt with a number of bylaw changes and updates. I'm most pleased with our work in simplifying the process for electing delegates for the Synod National Convention. A number of quirks made it a bit of a frustrating process and we were able to streamline things.

Against Racism

The Convention passed a number of resolutions related to cultural issues. Regarding racism, 11-02A condemns racism in every form and acknowledges that certain organizations, political movements and ideologies—such as Black Lives Matter (BLM); Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (DEI); and Critical Race Theory (CRT)—include controversial aspects that espouse unbiblical teachings. It also condemns other movements such as White Supremacy, White Nationalism, and Nazism that divide people on the basis of race. Previously the Synod has spoken against racism 36 times in convention just since 1956 and did so again in Milwaukee.

Abortion and Fetal Tissue in Medicine

Floor Committee 11 addressed abortion and the use of fetal tissue in vaccines. Res. 11-04 asks the Commission on Theology and Church Relations (CTCR), in consultation with LCMS Life Ministry, to address the issue of abortion especially in relation to the use of aborted fetal tissues in vaccinations. "Res. 11-04 is not intended to comment on any vaccine in particular, but instead highlight the need for more guidance from the Synod," said the Rev. Michael Schuermann, FC 11 secretary.

Mandatory Registration of Women for the Draft

While not currently necessary, it seems possible that in the near future women may be compelled to register to be drafted into the armed forces such as men currently are. The resolution passed does not speak against the voluntary participation of women in the military but provides a means for LCMS women to conscientiously object to mandatory participation.

Government Interference in Worship Practices

Resolution 11-05 asserted that the state does not have God-given authority to direct the church's liturgical and sacramental life. It affirmed that "gathering together in person to receive God's gifts in Word and Sacrament is essential for the health and well-being of God's people."

Concordia University System and Concordia University Texas

In the last two years, two Concordia University campuses closed: Portland, Oregon and Bronxville, New York. The Convention gave thanks to God for the work of these institutions over the years and voiced support for their alumni and communities.

The Synod passed a new structure of oversight for the Concordia Universities. The presidents of five Concordia University schools (Nebraska, Chicago, California, Wisconsin/Ann Arbor, and St. Paul) all endorsed the changes and the institutions had been closely involved with their development. This was the culmination of work required by a 2019 resolution.

Concordia University Texas (CTX) has been host to a complex series of events beginning in November, 2022 when their Board of Regents voted to disassociate from the LCMS and filed for reincorporation in the state of Texas. In these new articles of incorporation, they eliminated any mention of the relationship between the LCMS and the University, in particular the Synod's role in theological oversight of their Lutheran identity.

The Synod bylaws and original governing documents of CTX recognize that CTX is a steward of the Synod's university and that the Synod plays a role in electing members of the Board of Regents and the process for selecting a President. CTX has rejected these as infringements to their independent governance.

The Convention passed Resolution 7-03, "To Call Concordia University Texas Leadership to Repentance." During the discussion, CTX President and CEO, Dr. Don Christian was allowed to address the convention body. He outlined the actions of the CTX Board of Regents but also asserted that the CTX Board remains the sole governing body of the school. It was pointed out to the delegates that this assertion is at the heart of the dispute and breaks from the rules of governance from the Synod. At the heart of the resolution is not just the call to repentance but the sincere desire for repentance and reconciliation with the members of the CTX Board and return to a healthy relationship with the Synod.

Reports and Rejoicing

Throughout the week the delegates received greetings and updates from various LCMS entities such as Concordia Publishing House, the LWML and LLL, and international missionaries. Each day was punctuated by scripture, worship, prayer, and song from voices around the globe. God is truly doing great things through the faithful witness of the LCMS by way of the congregations, schools, members, and workers. It was a blessing to be involved in the convention and I give thanks to God that St. Paul is united with such a faithful body of fellow believers.

FROM THE PASTORAL ASSISTANT'S DESK

Brothers & Sisters of the Lord,

I am extremely grateful that you all have chosen to put your trust in me to assist Pastor Zielinski in carrying out the ministries of the church. It is a great honor to be allowed to serve the members of St. Paul.

One of my biggest responsibilities will be working with our youth. I consider this a very high calling of service, as statistics show that nearly 70% of youth stop attending church after they graduate from high school. Less than half of those who leave will return. Discipling our young men and women as they move from confirmation and into the world is extremely important.

In September we will begin holding bi-weekly Youth Group activities at the church from 6:30-8:00 PM. Each gathering will include time for fellowship, devotional study, and team building activities. Our goal will be to engage our 6-12 grade students with their faith, developing them as leaders in our congregation and in the community so that they are better equipped to carry out their role in fulfilling the Great Commission of the Church.

Other opportunities to help mature the faith of our young people are also in the works. On September 13th there will be an informational meeting to learn about an organization called Trail Life USA. Trail Life is a Christ-centered, boy-focused mentoring program that engages boys in service & outdoor adventure to develop godly & courageous leaders. It is very similar in structure to the Boy Scouts but was founded on biblical principles of male leadership and Christian family values. Myself, Pastor Zielinski and the Elders have been discussing establishing a Trail Life troop as a long term ministry of St. Paul, not only to disciple the fathers and sons in our congregation, but as part of evangelizing to our community. The initial program is targeted to boys in grades K-5, but there are continued opportunities to grow throughout the high school years.

Please keep these things in prayer as we move forward. If you have children or grandchildren in these age ranges, please consider attending the information meeting or encouraging them to get involved in these programs.

THRIVENT FINANCIAL: TROUBLING ENDORSEMENTS

Beloved of the Lord at St. Paul,

This past June was marked as "Pride Month" by those supportive of a sexual ethic condemned by God's Word. This also included the financial organization, Thrivent. Many of you have asked me about Thrivent, wondering what is going on, and wondering what to do now that Thrivent is supporting a sinful lifestyle.

For decades, Lutherans have trusted Thrivent and its predecessor organizations, Aid Association for Lutherans (AAL) and Lutheran Brotherhood (LB) for financial products such as life insurance and investments. About twenty years ago, AAL and LB merged to form "Thrivent Financial for Lutherans." Over time that name changed to just "Thrivent." The Lutheran identity and confession of faith that joined investors together slowly decayed into little more than a generic Christian identity and now finally, into a culturally corrupt, false confession of Christianity



that is celebrating a sinful sexual ethic. It seems that they have now worn out the long-suffering patience of faithful members.

The investing and financial products marketplace can be a challenging place to maintain a Christian witness. Nearly every secular company is going to have some aspect of their business with which Christians may take issue. It would be an impossible task to only do business with those who share our Christian worldview. There may be times when a pronounced and public act of a business makes it clear that we do not want to do business with them, and that is a choice we are free to make as Christians.

In the case of Thrivent, we do not simply have a secular company going along with the cultural flow promoting something sinful. In this case, we have a company doing so while also claiming to be a "Christian" organization. Therein lies a unique hypocrisy. If a secular company does something secular, it is of no surprise and not out of character. However, when a company founded on the notion of being a "Christian Fraternal Organization" does something contrary to God's Word, there must be a call for repentance and return to God's Word.

Are you invested with Thrivent or hold Thrivent products? I have no financial advice for you. I'm your pastor not an investment advisor. Are you

concerned about having investments supporting Thrivent's priorities? Then perhaps you should explore other options for where to manage your investments. Some of you may have products that simply cannot be moved to another firm (eg. life insurance). Don't let your conscience be burdened by something you don't really have control over. Maybe move what you can and be content with that. As you do so, make sure you let Thrivent know exactly why you're moving your investments. Perhaps they will listen to God's Word.

As for money received by St. Paul or other organizations from Thrivent, there are two different avenues: Thrivent Choice Dollars and Action Team Grants. Thrivent is required to distribute a portion of their profits as a "fraternal organization." They were established to support Lutheran Churches and so must continue to distribute funds to churches and other charitable organizations.


Thrivent Choice Dollars is the program where some of the charitable dollars can be directed according to the wishes of individual investors. If you have products with Thrivent, you will be able to direct some of their charitable giving in proportion to the value of your products. Greater holdings means more to direct. If these funds are not directed by you or other investors, they will revert to the Thrivent Board of Directors to still be given away as they decide instead of you.

If you continue to hold products with Thrivent and are able to direct some of their charitable giving, I encourage you to do so, even here to St. Paul. Why not redeem these funds for good purposes that support your faith rather than leave them in the hands of Thrivent which has shown itself not to share your priorities?

Action Team Grants are another way Thrivent directs their charitable dollars. Members of Thrivent can apply for grants of \$250 for particular projects and events. If Thrivent were to require grant recipients to promote Thrivent as a condition of receiving the grant, I would not be in favor of using them. However, it currently does not seem to be the case that we would have to promote Thrivent in order to receive the grant. So, once again, it's an opportunity to redeem dollars for good purposes rather than leave them to the Thrivent Board for use.

Based on Thrivent's public endorsement of a lifestyle and sexual ethic that is clearly contrary to God's Word, I cannot recommend them nor do I want to promote their products to God's people whom I serve. I hope that someday they would repent and we could once again be served by them as a fraternal partner. May God grant it.


